RE: The City of Guelph's Proposed Blue Box Transition Date

The City of Guelph is a leader in innovative waste management practices and in circular economy approaches. We strongly support the provincial decision to transition the blue box program to full producer responsibility.

On December 14th, 2020, City of Guelph Council passed the resolution below requesting to transition our local Blue Box program to full producer responsibility as soon as possible on January 1st, 2023. Delaying our transition will result in significant costs and labour relations challenges for the City.

"That the City of Guelph request that the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks accommodate the City's original request to transition its Blue Box program to full producer responsibility at the earliest transition date, January 1, 2023, or, in the event that this is not possible, that the City of Guelph receive full funding for the operation of the City's Blue Box program based on 100% of reported costs until such time as the program is transitioned to producer responsibility.

That the City's preceding resolution be forwarded to the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks."

Currently, the proposed schedule has Guelph transitioning in 2025. This delay translates into \$1.76M+ in additional annual costs to property taxpayers on the operating side and over \$2.34M to address capital needs as our City continues to grow.

An added complication for the City of Guelph is the upcoming expiration of collective agreements. This labour relations challenge could result in significant additional operating costs to the City above and beyond the \$1.76M/year if we are unable to transition our program in 2023.

To mitigate these challenges, and to allow the City of Guelph to continue being a leader in innovative waste management practices, I ask that the province enable the City to transition its blue box program at our requested date (January 1st, 2023) instead of waiting until 2025. For more information on anticipated impacts of delaying our transition, please see the briefing note accompanying this letter.



Dear Premier Ford:

Speeding on provincial, county and municipal roadways continues to put the lives of Ontarians at risk. While we have access to several tools to help mitigate speeding traffic, the one tool that is currently not fully available to us is Automatic Speed Enforcement (ASE) (aka Photo Radar). Over the past decade, in South West Oxford the vast majority of charges laid are for drivers travelling well in excess of the posted speed limit. The cost of providing police time for something that could be done through the use of technology is disturbing to our council. The Council feels that it would be far more effective to have police concentrate on other problems such as Break and Enters, illegal drugs and domestic problems.

We need a way to address the poor behaviours and habits that are putting our citizens at risk and tying up much needed first responder resources that could be better utilized to improve the well-being of our communities. Speeding, particularly through our small villages, creates community concerns for the safety and wellbeing of our children and other vulnerable members. We need your help.

In keeping with this The Council of the Township of South-West Oxford duly moved and carried the following resolution at the regular meeting held on January 5, 2021:

...RESOLVED that the Council of the Township of South-West Oxford provide direction to the Clerk to send a letter to the Premier, MPP Ernie Hardeman, AMO and all Ontario municipalities in support of the use of Automatic Speed Enforcement (photo radar) by municipalities.

RE: LINE 5 PIPELINE

On behalf of the citizens of Sarnia I would like to express our gratitude for the work your government has done to protect Canadians through the Covid-19 pandemic.

We know protecting the ongoing economic and energy security of Canadians is paramount for your government, particularly as we move into economic recovery. This is why I am raising today my deep concern and that of the community of Sarnia Lambton that the Governor of Michigan, Gretchen Whitmer's efforts to shut down the Line 5 easement could have extremely damaging impacts on the energy needs of Canadian and U.S. consumers, as well as the businesses and livelihoods that depend on the Line 5 pipeline.

As Mayor of the City of Sarnia, the Sarnia community and region of Southwestern Ontario relies on Line 5 for thousands of jobs and economic output that strengthens both Ontario and Canada.

I am urging you to reach out to U.S. President-Elect, Joe Biden and ask that this matter be handled by upholding the 1977 Transit Pipeline Treaty, which the President-Elect voted in favour of.

A disruption of Line 5 would result in a daily shortage of over 14 million gallons of gasoline and other transportation fuels, impacting people in Ontario, Quebec, Wisconsin, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Ten regional refineries would be significantly and adversely impacted, leading to a significant loss of jobs. Disrupting the line would also create regional propane shortages, higher energy prices and hardship for families, especially scoveries

those on fixed incomes or of modest means. That's unacceptable – even more so during this COVID-19 pandemic.

The Canada-U.S. 1977 Transit Pipelines Treaty (negotiated by Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau and President Jimmy Carter – and voted for by then-first-term Senator Joe Biden) precludes this kind of interruption of existing hydrocarbon pipelines. The Transit Treaty ensures that the United States, including its individual states, cannot impede pipeline operations that Canada depends on for exports or imports.

To address Michigan's clear violation of the Transit Treaty, the document provides a mechanism for <u>Canada</u> to negotiate with the United States, state to state. Given the national importance of Line 5, we need you to engage assertively with the incoming Biden Administration, communicating firmly that Governor Whitmer's unlawful and baseless effort to terminate the Line 5 easement is unacceptable and in clear violation of the 1977 Transit Pipelines Treaty. This is an action only you and your government can take and we are urging you to move quickly.

The Governor's attempt to revoke and terminate the Line 5 easement is improper, unlawful and will negatively impact people, energy and economic security on both sides of the border. Enbridge is currently seeking permit approval for the tunnel project and replacement pipeline which, upon completion, will make a safe Straits crossing even safer. We and many others need you to take action to ensure a peaceful resolution to this issue. Thank you for your attention to this matter.

Chair Carter called the meeting to order at 2:35 p.m. by teleconference call between the attendees and gave Territorial Acknowledgement.

5. **PRESENTATIONS/DELEGATIONS** - Integrated Youth Services Network

Cyndy Moffat Forsyth, Director of Integrated Youth Services Network Helen Fishburn, Executive Director of CMHA Waterloo Wellington

The Integrated Youth Services Network is a "one-stop-shop" designed for youth from ages

12-26, to meet mental health, substance use, primary care, education, employment, training, housing and other needs in a centralized location, where all service providers are on one system for full integration. There are four sites in Guelph headed up by the Rotary Club. A bold vision and plan of action is urgently needed, as suicide is the second leading cause of death in this age group in Ontario, and substance-related overdose deaths between January and August 2020 in Guelph has increased by 200% over the same time period in 2019.

A network of support is a safety net for youth and a more easily accessible system is required for them to receive the help before they reach the stage of drug use and suicide. This project is supported by MP Lloyd Longfield and MPP Mike Schreiner. A \$10 million fundraising campaign goal has been set and 48% has been raised to date. Once 75% has been reached, the fundraising campaign will go public.

The space they are creating is to provide the opportunity to be part of an integrated community-based team. The hope is that the Guelph Police Service will join as a service partner. It creates a safe opportunity to connect, build trust and be mentors to youth. Chief Cobey noted that a key priority of the Strategic Plan is Community Policing and initially, a representative from the Service could be assigned to join their service providers working group that meets once a week. Helen Fishburn reiterated that the current ask is not for funding, but for formal support for the project.

Chair Carter thanked Helen Fishburn and Cyndy Forsyth for presenting, and noted that the Board will continue the discussion on how the Service can participate as requested.

Helen Fishburn and Cyndy Forsyth left the meeting at 2:55 p.m.

7.6 GPS Use of "GrayKey" Technology

Chief Cobey noted that the goal of the report was to give the Board an overview of the technology used to do forensic analysis of cell phones in investigations for a variety of offences. The GrayKey unit has been exclusively used for forensic examinations once legal authorization has been received, whether by Court issued search warrants, Coroner's authority and/or consent of the phone owner. Overall, when a tool that involves forensic examination of phones is used, the Service has to be aware of privacy concerns, and also the responsibility to conduct a fulsome investigation of the offences being investigated, and to provide accurate and charter-compliant data to the Courts in a timely manner. The report set out the number of

authorized examinations and circumstances associated with the successful examinations. After Board discussion, C. Guthrie thanked J. Sidlofsky Stoffman for bringing clarity to this issue in the public realm.

7.8 Chief's Monthly Report

- 1) On Monday, December 14, 2020, two new employees will begin work:
 - a. <u>Tracey Dupuis as the Wellness Coordinator</u>: She has a great deal of experience working with the community and with our members as she was a member of the Impact Team.
 - b. Scott Tracey as the Media Relations Coordinator: He brings years of professional media experience to the role, has existing relationships with media partners and understands policing. We strive for transparency to the greatest extent possible as we engage with our community in an authentic way.
- 2) Chief Cobey thanked the Board and community for their support in 2020.

7.9 New Business

Mayor Cam Guthrie brought forward a motion that has urgency because of advocacy work presently undertaken by himself and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, opportunities that could present themselves with our MP and MPP and other agencies with respect to the IMPACT team (Integrated Mobile Police and Crisis Team) that we have had embedded within our Police Service for the past several years. Chief Cobey has communicated many times that it is important to have the right people meeting the needs of our community. Currently, we have 5 members of IMPACT at the Service who can attend only 35% of the calls, and recently have been

fortunate to increase the complement to 7 through funding from the Provincial Government. The results of their work are exceptional. When these members meet with individuals with mental health issues, they are able to divert them from hospital to the right agencies, which saves on resources. Guelph wants to have a Service that is able to do more than 35% and needs financial help from upper levels of government and other agencies.

Chief Cobey acknowledged Helen Fishburn, Executive Director of the Canadian Mental Health Association Waterloo Wellington, and who oversees IMPACT, as a leader in our community. He stated that we want to be a model to other communities as we demonstrate what is possible if we can provide proactive care 24/7 to those with mental health issues, to move them from just surviving to thriving.

Moved by C. Guthrie **Seconded by** C. Billings

WHEREAS the Guelph IMPACT Team, in which mental health practitioners attend mental health crisis and wellness calls alongside Guelph Police officers, has been an effective model to respond, provide service, and divert calls from hospital;

WHEREAS the IMPACT Team has been expanded, but still lacks the funding necessary to make the service available 24/7;

WHEREAS more community mental health services, and an elimination of wait lists for services, would help reduce the number of patients who reach a crisis point needing emergency response;

WHEREAS the Guelph Police Services Board agrees with the Centre for Addictions and Mental Health (CAMH) that transformative change is needed in how we proactively support the mental health needs of our community;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Guelph Police Services Board calls on upper levels of government to provide adequate, sustainable funding for a health care response to mental health crises, including sustainable funding for mental health practitioners to respond alongside, or when appropriate, instead of police;

AND THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Guelph Police Services Board calls on the upper levels of government to provide adequate, sustainable funding for community mental health services, to help people avoid reaching a point of mental health crisis requiring an emergency response;

AND THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Guelph Police Services Board calls on upper levels of government to undertake a comprehensive review of the system of mental health crisis response and wellness checks, to ensure that people experiencing a mental health crisis receive the most appropriate response;

AND THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Guelph Police Services Board Chair write to the Honourable Justin Trudeau, Prime Minister of Canada, the Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, and the Honourable Sylvia Jones, Solicitor General, along with other police services in Ontario, Lloyd Longfield, MP and Mike Schreiner, MPP, to share this resolution.
