Sanguen Health Centre provides health and social care for people who face barriers to accessing traditional supports, including people who experience homelessness, use drugs, and are living with Hepatitis C.

We provide access to health and social services in 7 rural communities and 5 urban stops in Guelph

Currently our Van program is funded through a 3-Year **Health Canada** Substance Use and Addictions Grant

What is Harm Reduction?



Harm reduction can be defined as a set of practical strategies with the goal of meeting people 'where they are at' to help them to reduce harm associated with engaging in everyday activities.

Harm reduction is a continuum. We provide different options for people to choose what is safest for them. Whether it is abstinence, new drug use equipment, or condoms etc.





- Fentanyl and its analogues are contributing to opioid poisonings
- Across Canada, it is estimated there are 21 opioid-poisoning-related deaths per day.
- Of all accidental opioid poisoning deaths, 81% involved fentanyl.*
- Locally, there were 7 suspected drug poisoning deaths in September alone.

The risks of opioid poisonings can be reduced through harm reduction interventions (safer supply, naloxone, Consumption & Treatment Services, needle syringe programs etc.)

Harm reduction and Outreach services provided from the Van include:



- overdose prevention training
- Naloxone distribution
- Needle exchange
- Safer drug use information (peer-based)
- Pathways to detox and treatment services
- Nursing care (wound care)
- COVID-19 support
- Sexually transmitted or blood borne infection (STBBI) testing and treatment
- Immunization
- Peer-to-peer support
- Basic needs enhancement (hygiene, food, supplies)
- Mental health crisis support & intervention; access to emergency psychiatric consultations
- Warm referrals for shelter navigation, social and health supports

By the numbers...



From July 1st- September 30th 2023

- 4,302 total interventions provided on van
- 2,209 unique individuals seen
- 120 individuals seen for the first time
- 188 patients received medical attention or treatment.
- 113 total number of referrals made to other services
- 367 naloxone kits were distributed
- 927 harm reduction education encounters occurred
- **1125** harm reduction education interactions



What have we learned about the people and communities the Van supports?

As part of funding received from Health Canada, Sanguen has worked with **Roots & Rivers Consulting** to evaluate our program.

"Other services are harder to come forth with problems. More comfortable here. Around the common folk here. Hospitals treat addicts horrible. When you see someone out in the community that you know, you know their face, more approachable."

Bringing a Harm Reduction Lens to all we do:


- Low Barrier Service
